SUMMIT/MEDINA WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT BOARD PERFORMANCE COMMITTEE MEETING OF MONDAY, JULY 29, 2019

I. CALL TO ORDER

a. Esposito called the meeting to order at 3:15 PM. Those present were introduced.

II. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

a. Esposito requested a motion to approve the Performance Committee's May 20, 2019 meeting minutes. Moran made the motion, Rodman seconded, and the motion carried with no objections or abstentions.

III. REPORTS

a. Preliminary SFY 2019 Annual Performance

Fry reviewed the Area's Adult/Dislocated Worker Career Services preliminary annual performance reports submitted by the career services providers, summarizing performance data for Summit and Medina Counties over SFY 2019, 7/1/18 - 6/30/19

- i. Summit County (United Labor Agency--ULA)
 - 1,005 placements despite a significant decrease in the overall unemployment rate for Summit County
 - Average wage \$15/hour, median wage \$12.50/hour
 - \circ $\,$ A large portion of placements were in manufacturing and healthcare
 - \circ $\,$ 36 ITAs with 89% of graduates working in their field
 - o 800 job seekers attended recruitment events coordinated by ULA
 - o OJT's about 50% successful, which is expected to improve with recent policy changes
- ii. Medina County (EDSI, ULA)
 - o Q1 Career Services provider was still EDSI; Q2-4 provider was ULA
 - 328 placements, significantly more than SFY 2018, with ULA placing 275, more than SFY 2018 with EDSI as the provider
 - A large portion of placements were in professional/business services, manufacturing, and healthcare
 - > The Committee and COG Staff discussed what types of jobs constitute these sectors
 - o 83% of ITA graduates are working in their field with 67% earning at least \$15/hour

b. <u>CCMEP Youth Program</u>

Fry reviewed performance reports for the CCMEP Youth Program overall and within each County combining State data through Q3 and "real-time" date from service provider, ULA

- i. Area 2 is meeting or exceeding all standards measured by the State
- ii. Data includes both WIOA and TANF-eligible participants

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- iii. TANF is an entitlement program and is not beholden to program performance like WIOA is; the creation of CCMEP by the state combines the two funding streams thus making performance standards required of the program
- iv. Performance meets all State standards for Summit and Medina Counties, with credential attainment far exceeding the statewide average rate for both counties

IV. OLD BUSINESS

- a. <u>Status of SFY 2020 Youth Program provider contract renewals</u>
 - i. Contracts currently being routed for execution.
 - ii. Project Learn declined to renew their contract.
- b. Status of SFY 2020 One-Stop Operator contract renewals
 - i. ULA was offered and accepted the first of two possible contract renewals to operate the One Stop center in Medina; that contract is fully executed.
 - ii. Summit County Department of Job and Family Services (SCDJFS) was offered and accepted the second of two contract renewals to operate the One Stop center in Summit County; that contract is fully executed. Issuing an RFP for the Summit County One Stop Operator contract will begin around February 2020.
- c. Phase II Summit County One-Stop Certification meeting with Operator on August 23
 - i. The One Stop Committee's review of the Summit County One-Stop resulted in a passing score, and the WDB passed a resolution to submit that score to the State for Phase II certification
 - The review revealed areas for improvement that will be addressed with SCDJFS, the current operator of the Summit One-Stop center, and the Managers of both centers will be encouraged to attend future meetings of the One Stop Committee
 - Some areas for improvement will require technical tools from the State that have not yet been delivered

d. <u>Status of ITA/OJT policy updates</u>

i. The committee discussed current revisions being made to the OJT and ITA policies.

V. NEW BUSINESS

- a. SFY 2020 Adult/Dislocated Career Services contract renewal
 - i. Pritchett made a motion to recommend the first of two 1-year renewals of the Adult and Dislocated Worker Career Services contract with United Labor Agency. Chesnes seconded the motion, and it carried with no objections or abstentions.
 - ii. Rodman made a motion to increase the budget of the current Adult and Dislocated Worker Career Services contract with United Labor Agency by \$3,500 for IT upgrades at the new location of the Medina County OMJ center. Moran seconded the motion, and it carried with no objections or abstentions.

VI. GOOD OF THE ORDER

a. Auditor of State audit of Workforce Area 2 financials is currently underway.

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VII. ADJOURNMENT

a. Esposito requested a motion to adjourn the meeting. Pritchett made the motion, which Chesnes seconded, and the motion carried with no objections or abstentions. The meeting adjourned at 4:12 PM.
